A BRIGHT FUTURE

ne of the primary purposes of Catholic education is to be a guiding light for young people - to set them on a path of faithfulness, leadership, service, and accomplishment. As we began the 2021-2022 school year, PND was blessed to have approximately 70 alumni, past and current parents, faculty, staff, religious, and stakeholders give back to the school by participating in a strategic planning process which will guide the school through the next five years.

The strategic planning process, which is being administered by Boston based Partners In Mission, began in September of 2021 with a kick-off meeting of PND stakeholders offering expertise in one of eight domain areas: academics, student life, Catholic identity, advancement, finance, facilities, governance, and enrollment. Five or six members made up each domain committee which met several times during the fall trimester to collect information about the school's current activities and status within the domain and write a narrative presenting the data collected.

All eight narratives were combined into one document which was presented to members of every domain as well as additional friends of PND.

The group was asked to read the narratives and fill out two surveys to determine the most important issues to focus on in each domain.

Under the leadership of co-chairs Karen Metzinger (AOL/SI '73) and Mitch Gilfillan (PND '02), the principal, and the Partners in Mission team, the strategic planning committe as a whole met for a weekend retreat in March to discuss the survey results and pinpoint goals for the strategic plan. Each domain developed one overall goal to work towards during the next five years with five objectives to accomplish the goal.

The next phase of the strategic plan is for the faculty, staff, and diocesan administration to review the goals and objectives for approval prior to the onset of the 2022-2023 school year. Once final changes to the plan are made and approval is received, the goals and objectives will be presented to the general public. Peoria Notre Dame faculty and staff will determine the measures needed to accomplish each objective laid out in the strategic plan.

We look forward to providing more details about the five year strategic plan in an upcoming issue of The Irish Lens!

A heartfelt thank you to those who attended the Heart of PND County Fair this year! This year's theme was all about celebrating the families and faculty that comprise the PND community.



Offerings included fair-themed appetizers, such as candied bacon, brisket nachos, mini doughnuts, and more; plus various games like a ring toss to win a bottle of wine, shooting hoops to win a Pop-A-Shot to take home, or throwing darts to pop balloons and win PND apparel and the chance to win Maui Jim sunglasses!

With it being the Solemnity of St. Joseph, we felt especially honored and blessed to have Bishop Lou in attendance! Energy was high, bidding was even higher, and all for a great cause. Senior Brady Culp finished out the night by speaking on behalf of the PND students to remind us all what the event is actually about - having some fun while fundraising to benefit the students of PND. This year's event raised more than \$116,000!

This year, our Fund-A-Need is to beautify our hallways. The existing lockers have only been "refreshed" one time since their original installation in 1966. Initially, we would like to clean and repaint the lockers, in addition to replacing the locks, updating the ceiling, and adding/replacing light fixtures in both junior and senior hallways. The estimated cost comes to \$120,000 OR approximately \$250 per locker. If funding is acquired, the plan is to have this work completed THIS summer!

Empower Our Students!

If you pay state income tax in Illinois, you qualify to re-direct your taxes to provide scholarships for students at Peoria Notre Dame. The Invest in Kids Act, initiated in 2018, provides an option to shift dollars to scholarships rather than paying money to the state of IL. In addition to helping a child experience a Catholic education, you receive a 75% tax credit. Yes, this is true! Donors receive a 75% credit on their state income tax, so for every \$4,000 you give, your actual gift is only going to cost you \$1,000 as you will get \$3,000 back when you complete your taxes next year.

PND has 65 students on the waiting list to receive a scholarship through Empower IL, the program the Catholic Diocese of Peoria uses for the Invest in Kids Act. It is our goal to get these students off the waiting list, and help provide each donor with tax credits. Whether you can give \$1,000, \$10,000 or any amount, know that you are helping Peoria Notre Dame families such as this one:

"Hearing that our daughter had received the Empower scholarship was like an answer to our prayers. We want our children to have the advantages offered by attending Peoria Notre Dame, but the financial strain had us considering switching her to our public school. It was a great relief to know she could continue to attend thanks to the generosity of those who so selflessly gave to Empower Illinois."

Along with representatives from various schools in Illinois and recipients of Empower IL scholarships, I recently spent the day in Springfield. I was invited by the Empower IL staff to join them in talking to legislators and encouraging elected officials to support House Bill 4126 which will make small tweaks to improve the Invest in Kids Act. Meeting some of the recipients of scholarships reminded me that a Catholic high school education can transform a life. The bill has passed both houses of the Illinois General Assembly, and is expected to be signed by the governor.


A New Blessing



LAUNCHING, LANDING,

and Making an Impact

High school is not just a time of passing through until adulthood begins. It is a time of preparation for bigger things to come. It's a launching pad for the future - not only for the betterment of the student, but also for the betterment of the world.

It is exciting to see the growth of our students during their time at Peoria Notre Dame, and then it is awe-inspiring to learn how their experiences in high school set them on a path to success.

Our graduates have chosen fields such as medicine, athletics, academia, the arts, literature, business, military, and religious life. They have used our school as a "launching pad" for their career and are currently fulfilling their mission in various parts of the world.

One such alum is 1983 Bergan High School graduate Bart Shatto. Bart has had a successful stage career performing throughout the country with the Gold and Platinum Symphonic Rock Band Trans-Siberian Orchestra for close to 15 years. Shatto has also played roles on Broadway including the iconic character Jean Valjean in Les Miserables.



Shatto said being involved in the plays, musicals, choir, band, and speech at Bergan made him visible and revealed a passion in him that became his purpose.

It gave me confidence and a feeling of belonging. I knew I was on the right path.

And the respect of my peers helped greatly.

Shatto, now living in New Jersey, said a solid Catholic education at Bergan afforded him opportunities he wouldn't have experienced anywhere else. "Once my siblings were out of high school in Bradford, my parents enrolled me at Bergan. The best decision they ever made for me." Shatto continued, "I was lost at first, trying to find my way and navigate my place in the world. Later, some of my best friends were honors students and valedictorians. I was around a lot of very smart and gifted people."




Peoria Notre Dame is truly one of a kind. You build legacy, friendships and integrity that will last a lifetime. Notre Dame always leads with education but remembers it's the character building that is priceless.

Arthur Johnson, SI 1953 graduate and former Chairman of the Department of Gastroenterology at Scripps Clinic and Research Institution in California, said he believes his Catholic education significantly impacted his career path and formed his character. "I think the Catholic values taught at PND are very important in our increasingly secular world."

Another alum who has launched a career in performing arts is PND 1997 graduate Liv Warfield. Now living in Chicago, Liv is a singer and songwriter who has performed with the legendary Prince and has been featured on "The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon," "The Late Show with David Letterman," and "The Arsenio Hall Show." Warfield noted many PND teachers encouraged her and helped guide her during high school including current social studies teacher, Mr. John Cummings.

Warfield encourages students to "always surround yourself around people and friends who motivate you to be at your best. At PND, I was impacted by the importance of community. I respected the school so much for that."

The recording artist, who now has received multiple nominations and awards for her music, recalls PND's longstanding tradition of chicken Thursdays and the laughter she shared with great teammates during track and field.





Book illustrator and illustration teacher Sarah Klise who graduated from AOL/SI in 1980 said while she didn't take a single art class in high school, there were many teachers who made a lasting impact. Sarah, who now lives in California, said she hopes she is having that same positive influence on her students. Sarah's advice is to "seek out people who will mentor you and build a support system. Rejection will follow, but so will small victories if you wait long enough."

AOL/SI 1979 alum, Msgr. Jeffrey Laible is the Vicar General for the largest diocese in the country, the U.S. Military Services located in Washington D.C.

While his father and uncle encouraged him to go into the military, Laible said "the priests that I knew in high school encouraged me to follow God's call to serve the Church as a priest."

Dr. Hannah Giunta-Stubb, PND 2004 graduate and medical fellow in Neonatal-Perinatal Medicine and Pediatric Pulmonology in Rochester, NY, said she is thankful for the high school teachers who nurtured her interest in biology, such as Mrs. Tallon. "I tend to remember the people who really invested in me during high school," said Dr. Giunta-Stubb. I will never forget Mrs. Crocker and Mr. Speck and all the Saturdays we spent at speech tournaments."



Catholic education emphasizes service to others, integrity, and an ongoing search for truth and good.

Sarah often illustrates books for her sister, Kate Klise, who is a well known children's book author, journalist, and AOL/SI 1981 graduate now living in both St. Louis and Portugal. Kate noted in high school, not every skill was learned in the classroom. "I was telling someone just the other day that everything I know I learned from working on the annual AOL/SI homecoming skits," she said. "From writing the script in a group to our crummy first drafts and lousy rehearsals to the importance of revising, it was all so subversively educational."

"My favorite activity was Student Senate. I feel like we spent all our free time going door to door, collecting canned goods. I loved those service projects that allowed us to work together in a way that felt meaningful and fun." Kate continued, "What I value most about my Catholic education is that the idea of service and giving back was always at the forefront."

Monica Cundiff, AOL/SI 1988 graduate and Illinois Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame inductee, agreed emphasis on service to others has made a lasting impact on her. "The guidance at Academy/Spalding to serve others that are less fortunate had a great impact on me to help others. Someone out there has many more challenges than


has delivered Meals on Wheels in South Bend for nearly 20 years.

SERVING LUNCH AND LOVE

Pat Matarelli - Mrs. Matarelli, I must say, because 22 years after graduating I still blanch at the idea of referring to any of my alma mater's staff or teachers by first name - was the first employee I encountered at Peoria Notre Dame. Some of us remember her not merely as the joyful keeper of order in The Commons, for Mrs. Matarelli (along with Jimmy – fabulous, ageless Jimmy) also ran the summer work program. Toiling on campus during a scorching August week in exchange for a generous little chunk of tuition assistance, a handful of us grimy, sweat-soaked Irish came to know sooner and better than any of our comparably comfortable peers that Mrs. Matarelli, luminary that she was, did not gladly suffer fools.

But this strictness, we knew or would eventually know, was born out of her desire to see the Godgiven potential that each of us held be realized, developed, and exploited. Tough love, we might call it, though back in the day (and still, really) it was called love, no superlatives necessary. A giving spirit like this is typically expected of a parent. Of an older sibling. A gentle teacher. A priest. And yet Mrs.




Matarelli could surprise you that way. I was still a Ritalin kid at the beginning of my freshman year in 1996, and much of the time I would have no appetite around lunch. I remember shuffling up to a cafeteria register one afternoon with only a cookie and an IBC root beer, Mrs. Matarelli looked at me with great concern and said, "That's a terrible lunch, Andy." She was right, of course, but I never forgot being moved by her sincerity. She barely knew me from my time with the summer work program, but she cared. Clearly, she cared. There are little gestures of kindness shown to us during the courses of our lives that stay tucked away in our memories because of some curious combination of effortlessness and substantial effect. That particular memory is mine. I try - not always successfully - to emulate that attentive kindness for my Virginia Tech students to this day.

Of course, you can't devote yourself to your students and not also delight in them, right? Mrs. Matarelli covered that base too, and ably. My younger brother, Mike, a squirrelly and preternaturally gregarious athlete, would sometimes get himself booted out of Mr. Sullivan's homeroom so that he would get to sit on the pew parked outside the Dean's office next to The Commons. This - coincidence of coincidences! put him in prime position to be first in the lunch line despite the stampedes of ravenous jocks dashing from the wings and the crush of band kids thundering up the stairs from down near the gym. Mrs. Matarelli couldn't help but get the biggest kick out of that. She knew better than any of us that we all fall short of the glory of God, and on Chicken Thursday, some more than others.







Mrs. Matarelli left us this year on April 21st, a few days shy of Divine Mercy Sunday. Consider mercy, the extension of loving forgiveness to those who don't deserve it, or who seem not to deserve it. (Pope Francis clarifies that although we believe that God is merciful. God Himself indeed is mercy.) How apt, then, that Mrs. Matarelli saw on us days that we were lovable and on days we were, well, capital-T Teenagers. Regardless, she gave us, in big ways and small, kindness on our good days and mercy on our bad. Why? Why us? And how could she have adored her job, trying though some days it doubtlessly was, so much that she remained a happy presence at school even though she retired back in 2017? Dear reader: you already know. When you think about what a treasure Mrs. Matarelli was to you, whether you remember her today or years down the road - because memories and stories are our transitory threads across time and generations - remember also that you were just as much a treasure to her.

Why did you choose to teach at PND?

I know I received the best education in the area when I attended PND as a student. My mom, an alum of AOL, taught for 40+ years. We can't go anywhere without someone stopping her and thanking her. I want to be the same kind of positive force for every student who walks into my classroom.

PND Alums form friendships because of birth defect

Most parents of cleft palate babies don't know another family facing the same challenges with the diagnosis. But seven PND alums didn't have to look far for support when their children were born with cleft palates.

When Justin (PND '04) and Molly (PND '06) Reeser's son was born two years ago with a cleft palate, they reached out to Kyle Ihnken (PND '06) and his wife Evanne who had a 6 year old son with the same diagnosis. Soon after, Tyler and Molly Fiddes (both PND '06) and Nick (PND '04) and Lyndsay (PND '03) Mentgen connected with the Reesers when they were pregnant with cleft babies. With that, a sort of support group was formed.

Molly Reeser said having the group has been invaluable in their journey with a cleft palate baby.

"Even though our children each have different kinds of cleft palates and varying



challenges, we are able to share information and resources which benefit our kids and us as parents," said Reeser. "It has been nice to not only have support from fellow classmates, but also to have others around you who have experienced the same challenges."

The group, which has since added another couple from the Chicago area, meets virtually once a month to talk about their children's surgeries, progress in speech therapy, dental issues, and other difficulties along with the successes.

Now the friends are organizing a fundraiser to raise money for Smile Train, a not-for-profit organization which provides funding and resources for corrective surgeries and care of cleft palate children. "This is the second year we have hosted this event. Last year we raised \$25,000 for Smile Train. We hope this fundraiser also raises awareness for cleft palates," Reeser said.

In addition to their upcoming fundraiser, the group of moms will be speaking to nearly 500 people at "Cleft Con" hosted by Smile Train on July 23.

Reeser said, "We are always open to helping other families dealing with a cleft. We want to make sure other families know we are here for them."

Our strong academics coupled with the encouragement and support our students need to succeed is a recipe for greatness which will change the world.



BUILDING UPGRADES

Peoria Notre Dame just got the green light to move forward with much needed improvements to the gym. The project includes 1) repainting the gym floor (\$20,000), 2) installing athletic flooring in the hall outside the gym (additional \$10,000), 3) replacing the gym wall padding (additional \$10,000). We hope to reach our goal of \$40,000 by August 1. To donate to the gym floor project, contact Director of Advancement Cindy Dermody at c.dermody@pndhs.org. or visit pndhs.org/gym.

This summer, PND will replace another section of the school roof. In addition, the fund-a-need project will begin, and workers will repaint lockers in the junior and senior hallways as well as replace locks, install new lighting, and update the ceilings.

Other upgrades to the facilities include digital screens throughout the school for announcements, updates, and reminders. In addition, smart boards will be installed in PND classrooms during the summer months. All of these technology updates are funded by a federal grant issued to private schools for technology upgrades.

Mrs. Katie Scharle 1931 - 2022






