Our Dean of Students Tim Speck passed away April 8 from cancer. A 1997 graduate of PND, Tim was a highly respected educator and administrator at PND for more than 20 years. Here is a tribute from fellow faculty member and friend John Donnelly (PND '99):

I remember the first time I really sat down with Tim and had the sense that we'd started to become friends. Tim, the sophomore coach at the time, and I grabbed lunch together one day at Donnelly's after practice. Tim started talking about teaching and how much he loved being around the students. He told me about the silly games and contests they'd do in class (and how, of course, those are the things the kids remember). I knew right then that I wanted to teach and feel the same way Tim felt about it.

The fun thing about working with Tim for some 15+ years (besides him being wildly funny) is that I was able to see him act on those principles he described to me all the time. Tim wanted the students to be happy, whether they were in psychology class or whether he was scaring them some as the dean those first couple years of high school (as they got older, they were able to see other sides of him, like the funny, caring ones). Tim cared about them.





Tim just never stopped caring about others. The more you knew him, the more people you'd meet that he cared about, from friends, to especially his family. He loved his wife Becca and his kids beyond measure - it was always a delight to hear him talk about them (especially if they were sleeping well, which wasn't always the case - he loved them all the same though).

Tim was a great dean and a great administrator. I know that sometimes he missed being in the classroom more - as dean, you're often dealing with the students after they've not been at their best. But his work allowed many other teachers to do their jobs and do them well. He was just always calm and logical. I'd always go to him if I had a question about something important because I respected and trusted him. I know I wasn't the only one.

I'm going to miss him a lot. I know a lot of people will. PND certainly will as well. He loved the place, as much as you can love a place I suppose, but he really loved the people there, the students, the staff, the parents - that's what we mean I think when we say we love a place. And he did so much for PND as a result of that love. He cared and always let that care guide his actions. So as a tribute to him, I'd encourage others to have their actions match their beliefs. Care for others, and in particular, Becca, Isabelle, Anna, Jude, John Paul, and Thomas. One of the things he said to me the first night that he told me about having cancer is that he was worried that his children would grow up without knowing him. And it's terribly sad that they won't grow up knowing their dad the way he would have wanted, which is why it's up to those who loved him to make sure they know how great their dad was and how much he loved them. And if you didn't have the fortune of knowing Tim, just care for others anyways and serve them and love them. Because that's what he did.

## Leading the way in STEM Studies

Peoria Notre Dame is proud to provide students with the opportunity to participate in a nationally recognized STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) program called Project Lead the Way. The program allows the students to solve 21st century problems through exciting projects, labs, and hands-on learning opportunities. Students may obtain Project Lead the Way (PLTW) recognition in one of three pathways: Biomedical, Engineering, or Computer Science. The Biomedical pathway is open to all students but is highly recommended for students interested in pre-medical, pre-dental, pre-nursing, physical therapy, veterinary, and other health-related service careers. It is an in-depth study of human physiology, clinical medicine, forensic science, public health, and diseases through the scientific research method. In addition, students also have the opportunity to work on an independent project.

The engineering pathway provides students the opportunity to engage in a design development process, which is not limited to: portfolio development, sketching and visualization using geometric relationships, creating models, analyzing and verifying model components, presenting product models, and developing marketing plans. The students work in teams to design and develop





an original solution to a valid open-ended technical problem by applying the engineering design process. They then present and defend their original solution to an outside panel. The courses provide students the opportunity to understand the field of engineering and engineering technology. Instruction is designed to assist students in learning how engineers and technicians use math, science, and technology in problem-solving processes to benefit people. Students are also expected to address concerns regarding the social and political consequences of technological change.

Through the Computer Science pathway, students use visual, block-based programming and seamlessly transition to text-based programming with languages such as Python to create apps, develop websites, and learn how to make computers work together to put their design into practice. They apply computational thinking practices, build vocabulary, and collaborate on products that address topics important to them. They also encounter cybersecurity threats and learn how to protect against them and learn how organizations protect themselves in today's world.

The Project Lead the Way program allows students to begin exploring STEM career paths and gaining knowledge in their intended field of study before setting foot on a college campus.

has trained 35 State qualifiers, 13 IHSA State Place-winners, and 1 IHSA State Champion. He has also coached football and track & field! But there will still be a Coach Burk as Kevin's son Danny is taking over as head wrestling coach next year. PND is incredibly blessed to have Coach Kevin Burk's leadership, expertise, and passion for wrestling all of these years.

We are also blessed to have IHSA's Coach of the Year among our athletic staff! Boys soccer Head Coach Mike Bare was recently named Coach of the Year for leading his team to their 5th state championship title in the fall. Coach Bare is the second all-time high school soccer coach for the most state tournament appearances, state titles, and matches won at state according to IHSA's website. Throughout his career, Coach Bare has coached 13 Peoria Journal Star Players of the Year, 24 IHSSCA Illinois All-State Players, 1 IHSSCA Illinois Player of the Year, 1 Gatorade Illinois Player of the Year, 6 All-Americans, 25 NCAA Division I Commits, 1 NJCAA Division I National Runner-Up. 1 NCAA Division I National Champion, 1 MLS SuperDraft Selection, and 2 Professional Soccer Players. We are so proud of Coach Bare and are fortunate to have him leading our soccer program.



Finally, excitement surrounded the school this winter as alum Will Church (PND '22) and his sister Margaret (PND freshman) competed at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships in the junior pairs division. The competition was televised, and the duo made the PND family proud!

## Empower the Future



Thirty-three donors took advantage of the great program which is available to anyone who pays state income tax in Illinois. Donations are used to provide financial assistance to our students, and the donor receives a 75% tax credit on their state income tax. Yes, not just a deduction, but a tax credit. Example: A household pays \$4,000 per year in state income tax to IL. The donor could give \$4,000 to Empower IL and designate it to be earmarked for Peoria Notre Dame students. The donor will then receive \$3,000 back when completing their taxes so their net gift is only \$1,000 and yet, PND receives \$4,000!

Matching gift companies such as Caterpillar will also match these donations so in the above example, you could generate \$8,000 for PND scholarships and your net gift would only be \$1,000.





## EXCELLING BEYOND IMAGINATION

During the 1980s and 90s, as computers were beginning to take hold, Spalding '77 alum, Ed Ringness forged a career as a Lead Software Developer at Microsoft.

At this point in history, it's hard to imagine our lives without computers. We use them for everything! In fact, they have become such an integral part of our lives that 85% of Americans carry a mini-computer in their pocket or purse everywhere they go. For our current students, they can't remember a time when computers were not utilized daily. But many parents and alums can at least think back to a time when computers were just beginning to phase into our lives.


We take for granted the programs we now use every day for ease, convenience, and computing power. One such program that defines these aspects we have come to depend upon is Microsoft Excel. From simply alphabetizing lists to creating pivot tables, Excel has forever changed both mundane and complex tasks. And we have a Spalding Institute alum to thank for this and a few other life—altering computer programs.

**Edward Ringness** grew up attending grade school at Sacred Heart where he says he began his love of math and science. He was given the opportunity to take algebra in 8th grade which put him a year ahead of his peers in math. He attended Spalding Institute where he continued to excel among his classmates.

"By senior year, there weren't any more math classes for me to take at Spalding, so I went to ICC and took math there in the evening. That's where I ran into computers," Ringness said. "They had a teletype computer system in a room, and I became interested and watched how that worked."

Ringness graduated as valedictorian from Spalding in 1977, just as computers were beginning to make major strides towards mass production and personal use. Beginning his first year at Harvard, Ed thought he would major in chemistry or another science, but his focus guickly changed.

"When I went to college, I took some computer classes, and that's when I really decided that's what I wanted to do," said Ringness. "At the time, the field was changing, and universities had a lot more computers than high schools or any other place really. Even my father who was an engineer at Caterpillar didn't have access to computers back then."



Ringness noted that while there was a sequence of classes for Harvard students to take with computer science professors to earn a degree in the new and emerging field, there was not an organized computer science department back then.

When Ed graduated from Harvard in 1981, most computer customers were businesses, accounting firms, and schools. Desktop microcomputers were being developed. But they were used mostly by hobbyists, and the average individual wouldn't think about having one for personal use. But by the time he started working for Microsoft in 1982, there were a lot of small software companies, and they were all very interested in the new microcomputers that would inevitably become personal computers.

"I started at Microsoft as a Junior Developer working on a piece of coding for one program. The company could see there was a big potential group of customers. So, we were writing specialized software for the burgeoning market of microcomputers," said Ringness.

Eventually Ringness became a Lead Software Developer at Microsoft, heading teams of developers to create new products for a rapidly growing and changing technology world. But the rate of product development often proved to be too fast for users. That's when Ringness began working on a program called Microsoft Publisher.



"Publisher is a program designed to create flyers, newsletters, greeting cards, and other printed materials. Many people don't have skills for any kind of graphic design. So, our new idea was to make it easier by creating 'wizards' which would ask the user a series of questions. Then the computer would be able to create a document based on the answers. While other computer products

have since implemented 'wizards,' that was first done in Publisher by our development group."

Ringness recognizes the math and science courses he took in high school were essential to preparing him for a career in STEM. "My math teacher, Fr. Teed, was a good influence on me. He had this saying about math, 'You always have to push the pencil. Eventually you will just figure it out.' I've found that to be true. If you just keep going, eventually you will come up with a solution."

While Microsoft Publisher is still available, it's not as popular as one of the other programs Ed helped develop ... Microsoft Excel. "Today's version of Excel looks quite different, and it has so many more features compared to when we started. I still recognize many capabilities and functions, but it's so much more powerful than we imagined back then."




Recalling his Spalding days, Ed said, "I feel like I got a good education. Even though Spalding was a Catholic school, it drew kids from all over town and surrounding areas. I felt like I got to know people from a variety of backgrounds which helped me later in life."

He added, "Going to a Catholic school, we were encouraged to volunteer which had a big impact on me, and I have continued my volunteerism throughout life. At Spalding, I received a good training in the Gospels and values of the Church. Even

though professionally religion didn't come up explicitly, it helped me in understanding how to approach people and what is important."

Ed has some valuable advice for students looking to make a career in technology and computer science. "Bear in mind all the knowledge humans have was discovered throughout history, and yet there are new discoveries and technologies still to be made. So, pay attention and learn the fundamentals in class. But remain curious too because things may change in the future, and you may be involved in that change."

Ed retired from Microsoft in 1999. He lives in Seattle with his wife Marjorie. They have two adult sons — Will, who lives in Seattle with his wife and daughter, and James, who lives in Chicago.







Peoria Notre Dame is proud to have many alums flourishing in STEM careers. In all sectors of science, technology, engineering, and math, our graduates are not only forging careers in these important fields, but they are making a difference in the lives of others.

One such alum is **Dr. Sara Barnato Giordano** (PND '98).
She is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and a Senior Physician at the world-renowned Dana Farber Cancer Institute. Dr. Giordano specializes in breast oncology, and her research is focused on novel therapies in the treatment of breast cancer.

Inspired by her father's passion for caring for patients in his pharmacy and by her aunt's own breast cancer journey, Dr. Giordano was called to her chosen career path in high school.

"When I started at Peoria Notre Dame, I knew I was interested in pursuing a career in medicine," she said. "My coursework in mathematics and science was stimulating, rooted in problem-based learning, and prepared me for sucess at college."

Dr. Giordano noted her Catholic academic foundation provided her with the ability to be a confident thinker, and it rooted compassion and benevolence in her. "It was instilled in me that my responsibility is to leave the planet better than when I entered."

"The teachers were not only passionate about education, but they were also focused on faith and helping me learn who I am as a Christian," she added. "These are both strong pillars which are the roots of my present day drive and success."

"I am blessed and humbled each day to be involved in a patient's cancer care," said Giordano. "It is a life-altering experience to be diagnosed with cancer. I am honored to have patients trust me and allow me to be a part of their life and this difficult and sometimes tumultuous journey."

Also leading the way in academia is **Dr. Patrick Archer**,


Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at St. Ambrose University and a professor of sociology. Dr. Archer is a 1996 graduate of PND, and he earned his PhD from Iowa State University in Sociology.

"I would say my sophomore Honors Geometry class with Ms. Clark was the first time that math seemed fun for me," said Archer.

With years of studying quantitative sociology, Archer has had to flex his math and science skills in both scientific data collection and statistical analysis.



His advice for current high school students is to keep an open mind about future plans and consider a STEM career.



1954 Spalding Institute graduate **Dr. Robert Myers** would agree. He spent more than 50 years teaching math to students, mostly at the collegiate level.

While at Spalding, Myers followed the academic math track, which was similar to honors courses back then.

Myers admits education was not his main focus in high school, but rather playing sports. "My friends and I used to joke around about which career would make more money, a pro-athlete or a teacher," he laughed. "While pro-athletes make more these days, there is no denying our teachers are making a bigger difference in the world."

After serving four years in the Army, he attended Illinois State to receive a teaching degree and then a masters at Harvard. Myers moved on to Northern

Michigan University to obtain his PhD while teaching math in 1971. Dr. Myers retired in 2013.

Another alum who is making a difference in her STEM career is **Dr. Suzanne Gilles**. She is a 1996 graduate of PND and a veterinarian in the Peoria area. Dr. Gilles said she knew from a very young age that she wanted to be a veterinarian.



"My grandpa had a great influence on me," said Gilles. "Growing up, we were always out in nature searching for little animals and bugs. Since then, I knew I wanted a career dealing with animals in some degree."

Gilles recalls PND teacher and track coach Mr. Cummings really encouraged her in her career path. "He taught me that with perseverance and hard work, you will reach your goals, either in track or in your everyday life."

Academy/Spalding 1989 grad **Cindy Loos** is a mechanical engineer. After graduating from Eastern Illinois University with a math education degree, teaching jobs were unavailable.

She was then encouraged to pursue a career in engineering.

"I always liked math, so I thought it would be a good fit," said Loos. And it turns out engineering was her calling.


For her efforts and leadership within her career and community, Loos has been named on both the 40 Under 40 and 25 Women in Leadership lists.
